At the close of voter registration on April 2, 2013 there were nine hundred and eleven (911) registered voters in the Town of Chilmark. With two-hundred and twenty (220) voters present at the Annual Town Meeting, 24% of the total number of registered voters, the Moderator called the meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. Constable Marshall E. Carroll, III attested to the posting of the warrant. A cub scout and his leader led the town in the Pledge of Allegiance. The Moderator asked for a moment of silence for the Boston Marathon bombing victims.

ARTICLE 1. Article 1 was postponed by the Moderator until the Annual Town Election at 7AM, Tuesday, April 30, 2013.

ARTICLE 2. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Judith Jardin was recognized and asked for clarification of why the town does not vote to amend the compensation plan each year. Tim Carroll and Selectman Doty both responded to the question. Mr. Carroll stated the compensation plan has never been amended on town meeting floor. Mr. Doty explained that a formula for cost of living adjustment (COLA) was established and described the process for the COLA recommendation and vote. He stated the Board of Selectmen approved the COLA.

The Moderator asked if there were any other reports from Town Officers or committees. No other reports were made.

ARTICLE 3. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. The Moderator stated he would not read the departmental budgets. Moderator asked that anyone with questions about the budget rise and be recognized. There was no discussion.

The Moderator brought Article 3 to a vote.

Article 3 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 4. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Tim Carroll was recognized and amended the article to replace the phrase, “General Fund Account 145-9291-5700”, with “available funds in the treasury.” The amendment was seconded. The Moderator read the article as amended and asked if there was any discussion. There was no discussion. The Moderator brought the amendment to a vote.

The Moderator stated the amendment is carried.

The Moderator read the article, as amended. The motion was seconded and there was no discussion.

The Moderator brought the article, as amended, to a vote.

Article 4, as amended, passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 5. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 5 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 6. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

The Moderator declared Article 6 is carried.

ARTICLE 7. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 7 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 8. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 8 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 9. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Tim Carroll was recognized and made a motion to indefinitely postpone the article. The motion was seconded. No discussion.

Article 9 was postponed indefinitely.

ARTICLE 10. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. The Moderator reminded voters this article would require a 2/3rds majority vote to pass due to the fact that it required transferring money from the General Stabilization Fund. Jay Lagemann was recognized and inquired why intermittent road repair was not done throughout the winter. The Moderator asked if the Highway Superintendent was in the audience. He was not. Selectman Doty was recognized and explained the long-term plan for road repair and recognized that Mr. Lagemann's suggestion was good. Rodney Bunker was recognized and asked whether the article would address potholes on Menemsha Hill. Mr. Bunker was informed the potholes would be addressed in the next article.

Article 10 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 11. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. The Moderator reminded voters this article would require a 2/3rds majority vote to pass due to the fact that it required transferring money from the General Stabilization Fund. The Moderator noted that the name of the road is D.H.'s Road, not Menemsha Hill. No discussion.

Article 11 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 12. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 12 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 13. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 13 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 14. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Tim Carroll was recognized and made a motion to

amend the article to change the date of the fiscal year to FY2014. The motion was seconded. No more discussion occurred. The amendment was brought to a vote.

The Moderator declared the amendment was carried.

The Moderator read the article, as amended. The motion was seconded. There was no discussion. The Moderator brought the article to a vote.

Article 14, as amended, passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 15. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 15 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 16. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 16 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 17. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 17 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 18. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 18 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 19. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. The Moderator declared this article would require a 4/5ths majority vote in order to pass. No discussion.

Article 19 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 20. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.

Article 20 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 21. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. The Moderator stated the date printed in the warrant article was incorrect and changed it to April 30, 2013. No discussion.

Article 21 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 22. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.
Article 22 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 23. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.
Article 23 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 24. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.
Article 24 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 25. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.
Article 25 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 26. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Eric Glasgow asked for clarification of the article. Selectman Doty clarified the costs of a new ambulance and the different funds from which the expense would be drawn. Selectman Mayhew further clarified the plan for a new ambulance. Rodney Bunker was recognized and asked if the Selectmen had found out if the new ambulance would fit in the garage. The Selectmen stated they had checked this. Frank Dunkl was recognized and asked for a round of applause for the town's EMTs. A round of applause was given. Eric Glasgow asked if there was a possibility of a trade-in value. Selectman Mayhew stated that it was unlikely due to the wear and tear on the old ambulance.
Article 26 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 27. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No discussion.
Article 27 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 28. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. No Discussion.
Article 28 passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 29. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Frank Yeomans was recognized and inquired whether the vote on this article, by our town, would be sufficient to fund the project since other towns had not voted to fund this project at their town meetings. The Moderator called for a voice vote. He declared he was in doubt and asked for a standing vote. Those in favor rose. The tellers counted those in favor. The Moderator asked for those opposed to rise. The Moderator counted those opposed and declared the motion passed.

Article 29 passed.

ARTICLE 30. Read by the Moderator, moved and seconded. Frank Dunkl was recognized and asked for clarification of this article. Selectman Doty was recognized and explained how the tax collecting process has proceeded up until now and how it would change if this article were to pass. Judith Jardin was recognized and stated she was in favor of quarterly tax bills and would vote against this article.

Article 30 carried.

ARTICLE 31. The Moderator stated he would not read the article. The article was moved and seconded. Janet Weidner, Planning Board Chairperson, was recognized and gave an overview of the bylaw development process over the past year. Jay Lagemann stood and stated the bylaw needed more work and was not ready to become a law. He further stated his view that the actual impact, environmental specifically, should be regulated rather than size. Frank Fenner stood and also expressed his view that the bylaw was not ready to be brought to the town meeting floor. He stated his concerns regarding the regulation of character, the possibility of increased subdivisions due to the bylaw and the threshold size limit. Janet Weidner stood to respond to Mr. Fenner. Many voters stood to express support for the bylaw amendment. One more voter stood to express his view that the threshold size limit was too low. Robert Zeltzer was recognized and proposed an amendment:

“There shall be a joint Zoning Board of Appeals and Planning Board meeting on a biennial schedule to review the efficiency and address unexpected consequences created by this regulation and they shall report to the town meeting their findings and recommendations of this joint committee.”

The amendment to the bylaw was moved and seconded. Two voters stood to express support of the bylaw. The Moderator brought the amendment to a vote.

The amendment to Article 31 carried.

Deborah Hancock stood to state the bylaw is too restrictive. William Meegan stood to express support for the bylaw. More voters stood to state their support of the bylaw. Abbie Rabinowitz stood and offered an amendment.

“To change the threshold limit for a 3 acre parcel to 4500 square feet of total living area from 3500 square feet of total living area.”

The amendment was moved and seconded. The Moderator brought the amendment to a vote. The Moderator stated the amendment to Article 31 was lost. A voter requested a standing count. The Moderator asked all those in favor of the amendment to rise. The tellers counted. The Moderator asked all those opposed to rise and the tellers counted.

The Moderator stated the motion was defeated.

With no more discussion, the Moderator brought Article 31, as amended, to a vote. He stated the vote would proceed by Australian Ballot due to a petition to do so submitted by a group of ten (10) voters. The Town Clerk and the Registrars arranged the front table to serve as the voter check-in station. The voters were called by the Moderator, row by row, and proceeded to cast their vote on Article 31. The Moderator counted the ballots.

The Moderator stated the motion carried, 162 yes votes, 51 no votes and 4 blanks.

ARTICLE 32. The Moderator stated he would not read the article. The article was moved and seconded. The Moderator asked if any of the Australian Ballot petitioners would withdraw their request for an Australian Ballot process to be conducted for Article 32. Petitioners in the audience withdrew

their request. There was no discussion. The Moderator requested those opposed to stand.

The Moderator stated the motion was carried 42-11.

Moderator Everett Poole asked if there was any further business. Catherine Thompson stood and recognized Janet Weidner for her 4 years as Chair of the Planning Board. The Moderator adjourned the meeting until 7:00 a.m. on Tuesday, April 30, 2013.
